#### **SUMMARY AND STANDARDS**

## HOW DO COMPUTER Scientists **Think**?

Okay, now that we've learned what a computer scientist DOES, let's learn about how they THINK. Learning about how computer scientists approach problems, helps us see that they are not so different from some of the problem-solving strategies we use every day!

#### We are going to learn how to do all of these!

There are five main skills that computer scientists use to solve problems. They are often called "computational thinking" skills—an easy way to remember this word is that "computational" sounds a lot like "computer." Okay the core concepts are: recognizing patterns, using sequencing, creating algorithms decomposing, and abstracting. Dont worry, we will learn how to do all of these!

## PATTERNS & SEQUENCING



Today we are going to learn more about how patterns are used in nearly everything we do. A pattern is a thing that repeats, or a repeated way in which something happens.

Patterns can be found in many places in our lives. For example, there are patterns in weather such as seasons, days of the week, months of the year, moon cycle, and patterns on a leaf. [You can provide familiar everyday patterns that YOUR students may be familiar with!]. We even use patterns in our writing.

## SEQUENCE: AN ORDERED SET OF INSTRUCTIONS

Another new vocabulary word is sequence: it refers to an ordered set of instructions. In order for a pattern to make sense, it must be in the correct sequence.

#### SEQUENCE FOR MAKING A BOWL OF CEREAL



For example, here's a sequence for making a bowl of cereal. If we did these steps out of order, we would not be happy!

## **PATTERNS IN WRITING**

Patterns exist everywhere, not just in computer science. There are often many patterns found in writing!



Can you think of any patterns you see in books or stories you've read? (if needed, prompt students with patterns such as beginning, middle, and end; characters, setting, and plot; etc.)

#### **GUIDED PRACTICE: EXAMPLE A**

Daquan was watching TV and saw a commercial for pizza and that gave him a great idea! "I'll just make my own pizza here at the house!," he thought. He found his mom's recipe, which said:

"First, roll out the squishy pizza dough with the rolling pin. Then, use a spoon to spread on the red pizza sauce on top of the dough. Next, add shredded cheese all over the top. Last, top it with pepperoni slices, covering the whole pizza. Finally, put the pizza in the oven at 425 degrees."

After about 15 minutes in the oven, his homemade pizza was ready to eat!

#### **DO YOU NOTICE A PATTERN?**

#### FOR BOTH WRITING & COMPUTER SCIENCE, PATTERNS & SEQUENCING ARE Very important!



Transition words help us to put our writing in the correct sequence—it's just as important for human readers as it is for computers!

See, there are many connections between writing and coding. The fact that we use patterns and sequences in both is just the beginning.



We can use a program called Scratch to write code and tell our computer what to do. We can use it to creative interactive stories, games, and animations.



First, let's learn a little more about Scratch

Scratch - Imagine, Program, Share



Before we can start coding in Scratch, we need to review a few things.



These three terms are very important in Scratch. They are: [read slide]



"Has anyone seen these types of pieces anywhere before? (from warm up) These pieces are actually computer "commands." **Commands** tell a person or a computer what to do.



Lets look closely at these blocks again and what they say-

Click "switch,

Click "think,

Click "turn

"these are commands" written in Scratch code, which is the kind we will be working with. We put these commands together in Scratch by snapping the together the blocks so they hook onto each other like puzzle pieces. This allows us to code multiple commands in a single set of instructions.



For example, these Scratch commands have been put in the correct order from top to bottom you have created a sequence of instructions. This would tell the computer to say Hi for 2 seconds then turn right 90 degrees.



Guide Students through the main areas of the Scratch page "When you open Scratch, your screen should look like this."



"This main area in the center of your screen is the script area. This is where you drag you command block and join them to build your algorithm. You will find your command blocks on the left side of the screen and drag them to the center. If you decide that you do not want a certain block, drag it back to the left. We will learn more about this in a moment."



"In SCRATCH, an object, author, or character in a story is called a **Sprite**. The sprite you can see right now is Scratch the cat. The box here is blue because this is the sprite that is currently being coded. If this box is not blue, you will not be able to add any command blocks for your sprite."



"If you want to add another sprite or change sprites, you can click here, the small circle with the cat image and plus sign. The new sprites you add will appear in this box. But you can only add code for the sprite that is selected and is in the blue box."



"You can see scratch the cat here on the stage. When you run your code, this is where you can see the action."



"If you want to change your background or your backdrop, as it is called in scratch, you can click here. It looks like a small picture with a plus sign."



"In the upper left, you can see three different tabs. Code, Costumes, Sounds. Choose the code tab to build code from command blocks. Choose the costumes tab to change how your sprite looks. Or you can add new sounds to sprites here."



"Let's look closer at the code blocks. On the far left you can see several colored dots (some also call it categories palette). These are the different types of code you might want. You can choose motion, looks, sound, events..they are all different colors to help you. You can choose just one block category."



"Once you choose your category, the code blocks will appear here and you can find the specific command that you would like to give your sprite. Once you drag your code to the stage and click them together, you are ready to try it out."

## CHANGING SPRITES & BACKDROPS

Scratch comes with a preset sprite and backdrop. Let's look at how you'd change those to one of your choosing

Play Video, and explain: It may not be obvious but this cat looks different from the one automatically in scratch. This one looks like it's running. The "change costume" block in Scratch changes the appearance of your sprite. You can use it to change the appearance of your sprite. This block makes things simpler because we want have to use as many sprites in our project.

Lots of sprites in Scratch come pre-loaded with multiple costumes. So changing the costume is as easy and choosing one of these four looks.
